at WeSail@caverunsailing.org.



A good crowd stayed over Friday night, cooked out, and enjoyed the campfire. Twenty-two boats registered for the Regatta, along with 20 crew and 17 guests.

The "guests" did a lot of work to make the Regatta happen! The marina once again offered a large pontoon boat that we used for spectators and as a second safety boat. The spectators were really a mark-setting crew as it turns out and did a great job. Our safety boat service was provided by members Jim and Sharon Chandler, who were also kept very busy with setting marks. The race committee of Tenna Bell, and alternately Chuck Holden, Fresca Leddy, and Abbott Maginnis assisted PRO Paul White in running the races. Our outstanding meals were managed this year by Regina Heiser with a host of volunteers to make sure that everyone had a great meal once they returned to camp. Of special mention was our dinner of Beef Braciole

on Saturday night. Delicious!

This year we had enough Sunfish and Catalina 22's registered to have their own fleets. The remainder of the cruisers and dinghies raced in an open fleet of nine boats. We had three races on Saturday and two more on Sunday, for a total of five races in the Regatta. The Sunfish fleet was won by Dominic Keim, with Gail Turluck in second and Michael Jarboe in third places. The Open fleet was won by Daniel Leddy, with Brad Leslie in second and Luke Adams in third places. The Catalina 22 fleet was won by Mark Breeden,



with Mike Bracket in second and Chuck Emrich in third places.

CRSA Executive Committee!





Singlehanded Sailing

I see a distant blue sparkle as I drive up the driveway that leads towards Jacobson Park lake. It's Tuesday evening, which can mean only one think: Tuesday night Singlehanded Racing. I get out of the car and head over towards the large, grassy area where we set up our boats. Soon Lou Trost shows up with a canoe sticking out of the back of his truck and a bunch of red buoys—our "official" Race Committee boat.

We discuss the plan for the evening and he heads out to set u the course. Around 5:30 pm, our trailer of 8 club Sunfish shows up. These are Cave Run Youth Sailing Academy boats that the fleet has been generously allowed to use. Members are encouraged to bring their own boats, but these are available for people just getting started in racing. People start unloading the boats (quite a task) and rigging them up near the water's edge. By 6:30 everyone's out on the water sailing around and gauging the strength of the wind. Lou blows the 5 minute whistle

and everyone starts congregating around the start line. Five minutes later everyone is off and Lou shouts, "All clear."

Our CRYSA alumni often feature at the top of the fleet, which is impressive. Jacobson Park Reservoir is not ideal by any means, but it does provide a safe learning environment for beginners, as well as challenging the more experienced sailor with the shifts and puffs. After 2 or 3 more races, the sun is setting and it's time to head in. As the setting sun casts golden light over Jacobson Park, sailors chat, de-rig their boats and load



the club Sunfish back on the trailer. All is back to normal...until next Tuesday.

I started Tuesday night racing because I thought it could fill a gap in our racing series. We don't have a large fleet of singlehanded dinghies that race regularly. I specifically named it "Singlehanded racing" and not "Sunfish racing" because I don't want to limit the event to just Sunfish. In the future I am hoping to see Lasers and Force 5s out there as well, both very



popular boats. I chose Jacobson Park reservoir mainly because it is much closer and more convenient for the majority of club members. I was hoping that would increase participation, especially on weeknights. I also think it is a fun place to sail. It is small, but that makes it very safe and it is in the midst of a beautiful park. It is not ideal for racing, so as participation increases and people see how fun dinghy racing is, I would like to have race days at Cave Run Lake as well.

I want to encourage people to buy their own boats, whether it be Laser, Force 5, or Sunfish. The Sunfish fleet probably has the most potential for growth. I have been receiving numerous emails from Sunfish sailors around the area that are interested in becoming part of our fleet. I think it will grow fast. There are many Sunfish regattas in the area: the Pumpkin Regatta at Louisville Sailing Club (which was a great event) and a couple in Ohio and Michigan. The Sunfish class also needs a host for one of their regional championships next year. This might be an opportunity for CRSA to attract more sailors to Cave Run Lake and put us on the map!

I would also like to make the case for a boat that is very dear to my heart: the Laser, or ILCA. This was the first boat I raced competitively and it remains my favorite boat. It is currently the most popular racing sailboat in the world and is widely raced throughout the U.S. There are countless regatta throughout the country. It has excellent resale value. If you buy a good racing boat and keep it in good condition, you should be able to

easily resell it.

Most importantly, it is a very fun boat to sail. To my knowledge, three club members, including myself own Lasers. If a few more people acquired them, we would be on our way to starting a fleet!

Now that Fall is upon us and daylight becomes scarce in the evenings, we have moved to Saturday mornings at 10am. Come join us, whether it be to watch from the shoreline or participate in the racing!







and learn sessions. We are planning to meet at the US Forest Service office off KY 801 for the early sessions in 2024.

That's My Boat

Each edition of the MainSHEET will feature a boat profile of a CRSA member.

David and Jeanne Harris, tell us about your boat!

Growing up in Virginia, I have been sailing most of my life. I was introduced to sailing by my parents who enrolled me in youth sailing camps at a club on Smith Mountain Lake in the Roanoke Region of Virginia. We learned on club-built dinghies and Lasers. From that experience I bought a Laser 2 when I first worked in New Orleans. I subsequently moved that boat to San Francisco, Dallas, Houston, and finally to Cave Run Lake in Kentucky in 1990. When our daughter Katie was born I sold that Laser 2 to Chuck Emrich.

In addition to the Laser 2, we have owned three boats at Cave Run: a Catalina Capri 18 on C-dock, a Hunter 240 on the mooring field, and currently a 1998 model Hunter 260 on a mooring. I purchased this boat in 2021 from a sailor up at Rocky Fork Lake in Ohio and gave her a permanent home at Cave Run Lake. We renamed the Hunter 260, *Aeolian*, a geologic term for wind-related processes. The name seemed fitting since I am retired geologist.

The Hunter 260 is a 26' water ballasted boat, very similar to the Hunter 26, and the 240 we had owned previously. She has a fractional B&R rig with furling jib, and a retractable centerboard (6 foot draft) with 2,000 pounds of water ballast. This allows easy launching and trailering with a



full-size SUV or pick-up. My favorite features are the large cockpit, bimini, and stern rail seats. She has a steering wheel, but I miss the tiller on our 240. The extra 2 feet on the 260 gets you an enclosed head (porta-potty), galley area and dining table for overnights. We added a pedestal guard rail mainly to mount a folding cockpit table. A 12V fridge cooler fits in the ice chest space and is not too hard on the batteries. Since we are on a mooring a 50 watt solar panel keeps to two batteries topped off.

I have not had to perform a lot of maintenance over the course of ownership. The limited amount of teak was varnished when we bought her, so I have tried to keep that in good shape.

I oiled the interior teak this year and I will probably refinish the cabin sole next year. I did a "poor boy" bottom job while on the trailer last spring (skipped the areas under the bunks and the centerboard). It took two coats of VC-17m. The Tohatsu 9.8 outboard has been very reliable, with only oil changes and a routine water pump service. The 2 AGM batteries are now 8 years old and getting weak so I will replace those next spring. I am currently working on the trailer brakes.

We love the mooring field but dealing with the critters has been the biggest headache. We have had bats living in the bimini and a blue heron that loves our boat. Heron poop dries like concrete, so we tried all sorts of shiny deterrents with limited success. On our first overnight while sitting out watching the stars our heron swoops in and lands on the bimini so we knew it was only roosting at night. Now we use bungee cords across the boom and bimini to keep the heron from landing and it is working much better.

We are predominantly recreational sailors, enjoying relaxing and being on and in the water. While I don't race the Hunter 260 I have enjoyed racing with the RC fleet in Lexington.

Aeolian has been a nice sized boat for us and our sailing at Cave Run Lake.

That's my boat!
