Race Committee Boat Orientation Saturday March 30th at 11:00AM Scott Creek Marina

We will hold a short hands-on orientation for **all members** interested in working on the Margaret Mary II, our Race Committee Boat, this year. We will meet at the Scott Creek Marina at 11:00 AM on Saturday, March 30, on the dock opposite the fuel dock, adjacent to "C" dock. The Margaret Mary is a 30 ft long, 10 ft. beam, two story pontoon boat with a slide.

We will be offering hands-on experience for the following procedures:

- Starting and general operation of the boat
- Mooring the boat and departing from the mooring ball
- Setting up the recommended safety gear
- Docking the boat at the fuel dock
- Preparing and inflating the race marks
- Setting/anchoring and retrieving the race marks
- Setting and retrieving the boat's anchor
- Operation of the Ollie (race timer/horn)
- Use and timing of the race flags
- Securing the boat and stowing the gear at the mooring ball.



In addition, we will discuss first aid and safety equipment, as well as rescue procedures available to us.

The purpose of the orientation is to get more people comfortable in the operation and responsibilities of the Race Committee and this boat. Race committee service is a great way to spend a Saturday on the water, even if you don't own or race a sailboat. You don't have to be a pro race officer to be able to do it or enjoy it! All club members are welcome and anyone interested is encouraged to attend. No one is going to be asked to run a race for the club that doesn't feel qualified. Yet there is always help needed to operate the boat, set marks, help with flags or the timer and other related duties.

I expect that the orientation will last from 2 to 4 hours, depending on attendance.

Bring lunch and drinks and enjoy a spring day on the water.

new member sign up!







That's My Boat

I grew up in southeastern New Mexico and have been sailing off and on for about 25 years. A combination of a friend and cub scouts introduced me to sailing...first on a Laser. Over the years I have sailed a variety of boats, including a 20 ft trimaran, a Catalina 16.5, Hobie Cats, and have crewed on a Shields 30 while in graduate school in Chicago.

Depending on how you define "boat", we currently have 2 or 3 boats. We have a 2000 18ft Bayliner runabout for skiing and a 1982 Helms 24 for sailing. The other "boat" is the Dragon Force 65 RC sailboat...I encourage everyone to try a hand at RC sailing...it is a blast!





We purchased the Helms 24 from long-time CRSA member Ken Ruhl in 2023. It is a fin keel, masthead sloop with a beam of nearly 9ft and a draft of 4'2" that we keep in a slip. The boat's claim to fame is the 6 feet of cabin headroom! While the boat is in fairly good condition (especially for its age....I am the same "vintage"), I have been repairing and replacing items as needed: traveler lines, dock lines, sealing up leaks, etc. We replaced all of the cushions this year...it really spruced things up! I single-hand a lot, so I have recently added a headsail downhaul. Although the "to dos" list is always present, when I arrive at the marina to do projects, if there is *some* wind, I end up sailing instead!

As anyone who has joined the sailing group knows...I am quite competitive. However, I have not yet raced the Helms, but plan to do so this year. You'll find us out sailing when there is wind, and skiing when it's hot. The Ruhls named the boat "Dealer's Ship" and while we have not changed the decals, we call the boat "9/10ths".

Prescribed Fire US Forest Service

"Prescribed fire refers to the controlled application of fire by a team of fire experts under specified weather conditions to reintroduce the beneficial effects of fire into an ecosystem and reduce the hazard of catastrophic wildfire caused by excessive fuel buildup.

Prescribed fire is a fire management tool that allows us to reintroduce the benefits of fire to the landscape in a safe and controlled way. Forest land managers prescribe fire to Forest areas as a way to better wildlife habitat, reduce forest fuels (like brush, dry leaves, and shrubs), and better the general health of the Forest. When conditions are just right, fire managers carry out the prescribed fire treatments essential to improving wildlife habitat and maintaining a healthy forest. Every year, fire managers successfully treat around 20,000 acres on the Daniel Boone National Forest through prescribed fire." (Article taken from above website)

We are investigating the purchase of GPS controlled racing marks. These would enable us to set up true windward/leeward racecourses and eliminate getting our keels hung up on fishing line from our current method of setting the marks with rod and reels.

Let's Go Sailing For Women, by Women

Happy spring! The Let's Go Sailing for women by women (LGS) group will be ready. We have kicked off 2024 with three months of prep. Beginning in January with a focus on safety and a fabulous presentation from Patti Breeden and her daughter Katherine Rodriguez Guerrant, followed by an interactive outboard motor clinic!

Wednesday, March 6, with the help and support of both Chuck Emrich and Fred Pfister, we started our journey to destress ourselves from the outboard motor experience. Fred hosted at his home and both Chuck and Fred were ready to go over outboard motors in detail. There were two gas outboard motors, a trolling motor and an electric Torqueedo set up for us to explore. The outboard motors included a 5hp Mercury and the Club's 5ph Tohatsu motor. Fred started with the basics, which was a very good place to start! And gave us a six-step process to approach and start the motor.

List the process:

- 1. Make sure the fuel line is firmly attached to the motor, if not, connect it until it snaps.
- 2. Check that the fuel vent is open.
- 3. Pump the fuel bulb until somewhat firm.
- 4. Put the gear selector in the neutral position.
- 5. Pull the choke lever all the way out. (Check the CRSA boat checklist, as on a Club boat, the recommendation may be to pull the choke out ½ way.)
- 6. Adjust the throttle to start position.
- 7. Now you are ready to pull the start cord. Once the motor turns on, immediately start to push the choke lever in.

After going over the information, we each had the time and opportunity to check the spark plug and start the motors. As you can see it was a great day! Thank you to Fred & Chuck!!

Our final prep for on the water will be backing, trailering, and parking our boats. We are partnering with KY Fish and Wildlife, and Officer Tim Brett will be our instructor. We will be working with trailers for both sunfish and 22' swing keel sailboats.

This session is planned for Wednesday, March 27 at Scotts Creek Ramp in the Daniel Boone National Forest.

We plan to be on the water Tuesday, April 30 and RSVPs are required as we need to plan skippers, boats & crew. Please RSVP directly to me, at LGS@caverunsailing.org or 859-509-2249.
